FCC ADOPTS NEW BPL RULES, ACKNOWLEDGES ITS INTERFERENCE POTENTIAL

From The ARRL Letter October 15, 2004

As expected, the FCC this week adopted revised Part 15 (unlicensed services) rules to specifically regulate broadband over power line (BPL) systems. Meeting October 14 in open session, the Commission adopted a Report and Order in ET Docket 04-37. In comments before voting, three members of the Commission, including Chairman Michael Powell, specifically cited the concerns of Amateur Radio operators and expressed either assurances or hope that the new BPL rules will adequately address interference to licensed services. Republican FCC Commissioner Kevin Martin mentioned Amateur Radio's and broadcasters' interference concerns in a written statement. ARRL President Jim Haynie, W5JBP, said he was encouraged to see the Commission acknowledge interference to amateurs as a genuine issue in the proceeding.

"What the League has done in the last year and a half on this issue showed in the Commission's public meeting today," Haynie said Thursday. He cited the FCC's approval of three major points that the League had been pushing for: Certification of BPL equipment instead of verification, a requirement for a public BPL database -- something the BPL industry did not want--and mechanisms to deal swiftly with interference complaints. Haynie conceded, however, that the devil is in the details of the R&O, which likely will not be made public for at least a few weeks.

Anh Wride of the FCC Office of Engineering and Technology (OET), acknowledged that Access BPL devices "pose a somewhat higher potential for interference to licensed radio services than typical Part 15 devices." But, Wride continued, "we believe the specific benefits of BPL warrant acceptance of a small degree of additional risk, and that this interference potential can be satisfactorily managed."

Commissioner Michael Copps, a Democrat, said he remains concerned about nterference to Amateur Radio users. "I take the concerns of this community very seriously and believe that the FCC has an obligation to work hard to monitor, investigate and take quick action, where appropriate, to resolve harmful interference."


Copps said if interference occurs, "we must have a system in place to resolve it immediately," and he expressed the hope that the new rules would include such "rapid turnaround" provisions. Copps, who dissented in part with the R&O, raised the question of whether utility ratepayers should have to "subsidize an electric power company's foray into broadband."

The Commission's other Democrat, Jonathan Adelstein, said the interference question made the proceeding a challenging one because it had to accommodate concerns raised by Public Safety licensees, federal government users and Amateur Radio operators. "These are important services that we need to protect from harmful interference," Adelstein said.

Adelstein also said that while it's clear that some BPL systems can co-exist with existing licensees, others "haven't fared so well." He said those systems shouldn't be deployed commercially until it's assured thatthey won't cause harmful interference.

Commissioner Kathleen Abernathy, a Republican, said the FCC had to "make some hard compromises" to deal with questions about interference. But she expressed confidence in "technical solutions."

Chairman Powell called it "a banner day" for communications in the US because, he said, BPL promises



"ubiquitous service to all Americans at affordable rates." The chairman, a Republican, conceded that BPL will affect some spectrum users--including "all those wonderful Amateur Radio operators out there."

Powell said the FCC has taken Amateur Radio interference concerns seriously from the start and has put protections in place "to allow that service to continue." At the same time,

Powell implied that the FCC must balance the benefits of BPL against the relative value of other licensed services. Powell said BPL's potential for the US economy "is too great, too enormous, too potentially groundbreaking to sit idly by and allow any claim or any possible speculative fear" keep the Commission from promoting adoption of BPL technology.

ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, suggested that Powell was overstating the necessity of yet another broadband pipeline. "It's astonishing to me that the chairman of the FCC can talk about needing a 'third way' to provide broadband to consumers when multiple technologies already are available, including wireless broadband," he said.

The United Power Line Council (UPLC) applauded the FCC's action, saying the new rules should encourage BPL deployment while protecting licensed services from harmful interference. "We didn't get everything we wanted," said UPLC President and CEO William R. Moroney, who called the R&O "the result of close cooperation and compromise" with the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) to address its oncerns about potential interference.

Need to take an Amateur Exam? Exams are given on various times of each month throughout the San Joaquin Valley Section. Check the ARRL web page, www.arrl.org for the schedule by clicking on the Exams button in the upper left corner. You should be able to fine an exam near you. You can also check your local radio club newsletter or web page for an exam schedule. Remember the General Class Exam changed on July 1, 2004. Make sure the study material for General has an effective date of July 1, 2004.

Card Checking in the Section. You can get cards checked for awards within the section. W6XK and W6DPD can check your cards for DXCC in accordance with the rules for field checking. W6DPD can check cards for the CQ Awards, WAZ, DX, and Prefixes, and ARRL WAS and VUCC. Special Service Clubs may appoint a HF awards manager for WAS and a VHF Awards Manager for VUCC.

If you Work All States between April 3 and the end of 2004, you can apply for a WAS/90 certificate from ARRL. No QSL cards are needed, only log information. The cost is \$10. This is to celebrate the 90th Anniversary of ARRL.

When your affiliated club elects officers for the next year, be sure to update your club's information on the affiliated club area of the ARRL web page.

The Northern California Net (NCN), the Section Traffic Net, meets nightly on 3.630 MHZ at 7 PM Pacific Time. The slow speed training session of the net meets nightly on 3.705 MHZ at 9 PM Pacific Time. Handling traffic on CW is a good way to improve your CW skills.

Amateur Radio VE Exams in Fresno Unlicensed thru Extra Class Fresno Amateur Radio Club - A.R.R.L. VEC

Exams for all Amateur license classes will be conducted on the following day in Fresno, California. Exams are given on Sunday and Begin at 1:00 P.M.

* November 7

Location: Seventh Day Adventist Central Church, 2980 East Yale, Fresno CA 93703. One block south of Clinton and one block west of First Street, southwest corner of Yale and Orchard. Watch for signs.

Directions: From Hwy 99, take Clinton Ave. exit east four miles to First St., turn right (South), one block right on Yale, one block. Look for Signs.

From Highway 41, take Shields Ave exit, turn right (East), 1 mile to First St., turn right, continue one block past Clinton, right on Yale to Orchard. Look for Signs.

Theory Exams are multiple choice. Code Exam is fill in the blank. Express mail is used to send paperwork to ARRL, who sends data to FCC via electronic mail, thus assuring the fastest possible service on new licenses which typically arrive in about 2 weeks.

Bring: Two ID's, one with photo. Taxpayer ID Number (Social Security Number) or ULS registration number. Fee is \$12.00 per test session. Original copy of Amateur License and CSCE's if upgrading.

Talk-in on W6TO/R 146.940 repeater. Walk-in's only, no pre-registration.

The Satellite Beacon

This Month's Topic - Choosing A Satellite Radio By Emily Clarke, W0EEC - VP of Project OSCAR

The purchase of a new radio is possibly the biggest decision and most debated decision a ham makes. When I started out I asked a dozen people and got as many answers. In the end, I made my decision not on what people told me, but by considering what I wanted the radio to do. Choosing a satellite radio is easy if you know what your needs are. Rather than make specific recommendations, lets examine some general capabilities.

Simultaneous Dual Band?: Satellites generally transmit on one band and receive on another. There are a number of dual band radios, but can you listen on 70cm and transmit on 2m at the same time? This cross band mode is an absolute requirement. If you have a radio that will do split band operation, this probably qualifies.

Full Duplex?: Generally you don't need a full duplex radio for repeaters, however when operating satellites it is important to monitor your own signal as it is retransmitted by the satellite. Although you can work the easy sats with a split band radio, full duplex is highly recommended. Radios with dual VFOs generally meet this criteria.

Handheld or Base?: If you plan on working satellites indoors, antennas will probably be up on the roof or on a tower. You will need extra power (10 watts or more) because you will also have cable losses to overcome. If most of your contacts will be made outside with a handheld antenna, a handheld radio might be all that you need.

All-Mode?: All mode radios are base or mobile radios that can do both FM and SSB/CW modes. They are more expensive but put out up to 100 watts. FM only radios can be used for many satellites, but high orbiting satellites always use SSB/CW modulation. If this is your goal, an all mode radio is for you. A word of caution - some handheld radios say they are all mode, but it is generally only AM receive not SSB.

HF?: Currently only two operational satellites use HF. AO-7 operates in Mode A (2m xmit, 10m receive) and AO-51 has a PSK mode that is 10m xmit and 2m receive. Note that you need HF privileges to operate AO-51 in this mode.

Packet?: Some radios have built in terminal node controllers or TNCs. These convert data from the satellite and display them on a screen or computer, and vice versa. Other radios don't have built in TNCs but have a data port for a TNC. Make sure it supports 9600 band data

Computer Interface?: Not all radios have the ability to be controlled by a PC running a tracking program that will

automatically correct for Doppler shift. While not very important for FM, it is a highly desireable feature for SSB/CW operation. This feature is generally only available on all-mode base station radios.

Whatever your decision, they can sometimes become permanent. Though you can quickly sell a radio you aren't happy with using online auctions it's generally a decision that is difficult for hams to make. So the best advice is to buy a radio that meets your needs and possibly needs you may have in the future.

Allen was involved in amateur radio since about 1930. He and Ralph Saroyan, W6JPU were good friends and became licensed at the same time.


Like most amateurs, Allen enjoyed making contacts. He also enjoyed building his own equipment, although he used more modern gear later on.

Fran, N6JQW recalled quickly filling their motor home with gas and heading out to assist at the Coalinga earthquake, where their portable generator was used to power the lights initially. They also provided emergency communications at the King City fire, among others.

Allen was also involved in virtually every aspect of the Fresno Amateur Radio Club. He set up poles for antennas for many people around Fresno and had a good eye for balancing the structures.

One of his greatest pleasures was helping younger people obtain their licenses, and many kept in contact with him until he passed away. Some have stayed in contact with his wife, Fran, as well.

The spirit of J. Allen Ross lives on in the amateur radio community. Each year, a ham is chosen whose years of hard work and dedication to the club exemplify this spirit

Glen/KG6VWG gave an outstanding presentation on Homeland Security, which about 40 of our members attended. He covered examples of both domestic and foreign terrorism and outlined potential targets for terrorism here in the San Joaquin Valley. He also emphasized the need to be prepared for any emergency, suggesting the following measures: stay alert, take emergency response team courses (such as CERT or Red Cross), have fire resistant roofing on houses, save 2-liter bottles and freeze with water, and store water and non-perishable supplies in at least a three-day quantity. Glen also recommended the "Refuse To Be A Victim" classes, which will be offered soon. The classes teach how to see that potential trouble is coming, recognize it, and get away from it before coming to harm. CERT classes will also be offered in the near future. Kim called meeting to order at 7:02 with a quorum present: Kim/KF6ZSW, Craig/K6QI, Carole/KG6TTF, Jim/KF6GKC, Gene/W7POR,Bob/WA6ITN, Jan/KG6SUL. John Morrice/K6MI arrived at about 7:30.

Board meeting minutes of August 5 were corrected. Craig moved to approve the corrections; Jim seconded it. All approved, none opposed.

Treasurer's report: Jim motioned to approve, Craig seconded. All approved, none opposed.

Hamfest: Discussed.

The board went into Executive Session for approximately ten minutes (7:10 to 7:20) to discuss matters concerning equipment and personnel.

FARECC: Gene reported that Steve/K6FDR is planning an exercise to be staged at Holland Elementary School. The team can use his classroom to plug into electricity. Dan Pruitt's Parks Systems plan will be used to coordinate the activity. Twenty-one of the FARECC slots are filled, with primary and secondary responders in tiers.

Fall classes will be starting Sept 14-Nov 2 from 6:30 to 8:30 pm at Monty's KD6DRY; tech and upgrade to general.

Holiday Awards Banquet: Prizes were discussed, including the AES IC-T2H Sport HT as the grand prize plus "guy" prizes and "girl" prizes; budget would be under \$200. Craig motioned, Jan seconded, all approved.

Picnic: Harold is a committee of one looking into places. He suggested Woodward Park; the date will be July 9, 2005 11 am to 2 pm. As the city parks are already booking for next year, we need to send the deposit (\$87.50) within the next month or so. Some discussion was had; no motion made.

Field Day: FARC is trying to locate at a local high school, such as CART or Sanger High School. City Parks might not allow overnight visitors. Jim suggested Kearney Park; Harold will check into it.

FARC Fund Raising: Discussed fund raising. 501c(3) status is necessary for a lot of grants and donations. There is a company which will prepare the filing package; the cost would be approximately \$649 + \$500 filing fee. It will take 2-3 months to get all the documentation together; the goal is to get it in by December or January, as it may take 6 months to get approval. Jim motioned to approve \$1200 to lock that in, Craig seconded, all approved.

Paper Drive: Bob made a couple swings through town. Marcus is looking into a tarp. After the next Friday meeting, they will haul and empty papers. Members at the meeting can dump papers in Bob's truck or Paul's to take to paper trailer.

Web site: working great. QSL.net cleaned out, just left link to new site.

Old Business: Kim said that the new management that took over at Cedar Lanes (Ribs and Tips) does not seem as generous as previous owners. To help save money, it's likely to have board meetings at Bianchi Designs now or at board members' homes. The last general meeting was moved at the last minute by Cedar Lanes to the Walnut Room, which is much smaller. To reduce costs, we may use the Walnut Room from now on. The November swap will be in the Holiday Room.
