

"DX is the one you want but you don't have. That is the way it has always been, that is the way it will always be." Of the most recent DXpeditions, "If you worked it, it was the best DXpedition ever. If you missed it, it was probably not so good." "And so it goes."

All things are relative, some more than others. Thanks Hugh Cassidy, WA6AUD SK.

If you want help with DX, you can contact the local members of the Central California DX Club for some assistance. Charles W6DPD 431-2038, or Perry K6XJ 299-2802, can give you advice. The big thing about finding DX is to tune the bands.

The DX Breakfast is every Saturday at Jeb's Blueberry Hill Café, 3851 N. Blackstone Ave in Fresno. This group gathers about 06:30 AM. All are welcome.

Check out <u>www.spaceweather.com</u> and <u>www.solarham.net</u> for information on the solar cycle. The higher the solar flux and the lower the A and K Indices, the better the band conditions.

The address of the Sixth District QSL Bureau is P. O. Box 970, Fairfax CA 94978-0970. You can send up to 10 address labels and \$0.80 for each envelope to the address above. They will put 1 unit of First Class postage on the envelope. If you work DX, you should have envelopes at the bureau so you can get your cards. You may be able to check your status at the bureau at <a href="http://www.qslbureau.org/">http://www.qslbureau.org/</a>

The ARRL Outgoing QSL Service has raised the rates for sending ARRL members QSL cards to foreign countries. The new rate is \$2 for up to 10 cards in one envelope, \$3 for 11 to 20 cards in one envelope and 75 cents per ounce for more than 20 cards.

Postage rates around the world are constantly changing. To see current rates go to <a href="http://www.qsl.net/w9ol/IRC Chart.htm">http://www.qsl.net/w9ol/IRC Chart.htm</a> where you can find the current postal rates for most of the countries of the world. IRCs can no longer be ordered online from the US Post Office. To check on foreign postage, you can go to <a href="http://www.k4hb.com/postage.html">http://www.k4hb.com/postage.html</a>. To learn about addressing envelopes to everywhere in the world, go to <a href="http://www.columbia.edu/~fdc/postal/">http://www.columbia.edu/~fdc/postal/</a> for a discussion and examples. U.S. Postage will be increased soon. Overseas postage will be \$1.20; domestic postage will remain \$0.49 for 1 ounce. Additional ounce for domestic mail will be \$0.22. Postcards will be \$0.35.

If you don't get a DX Bulletin and you belong to ARRL, you should register on the members only web page and check the box for the ARRL DX Bulletin. This one is emailed each Thursday. Or you can go to the ARRL web page in the News/ Bulletin section and view the bulletins there. You can also read the OPDX Bulletin or the 425 DX Bulletin on the web. Search OP DX Bulletin or 425 DX Bulletin to get the URL. You can subscribe to the Daily DX, Weekly DX or QRZ DX too. These bulletins will keep you informed of DX operations and QSL information.

Exams for all Amateur license classes will be conducted on the following dates in Fresno California. All exams are given on <u>Saturday</u> and begin at 9:30 AM.

# August 8 November 14

LOCATION: ....Salvation Army Fresno Citadel, 1854 Fulton Street, Fresno CA 93721

DIRECTIONS: <u>From North or South of Fresno</u>, Take Highway 99 to Highway 180 east. Go east on 180 to Fulton Street off ramp. Turn right on Fulton Street. Go south on Fulton across Divisidero to Sacramento Ave. Turn left on Sacramento Ave and park. You have arrived.

Theory exams are multiple choice. Priority mail is used to send paperwork to ARRL, who sends data to FCC via electronic mail, thus assuring the fastest possible service on new licenses, which typically are posted to the FCC database by the end of the week following the exam.

BRING. Two ID's, one with photo. Taxpayer ID Number (Social Security Number), or FCC Registration Number (**preferred**). Fee **\$15.00** per test session. Bring exact change. **Original** and **copy** of **Amateur License**. Talk in on 146.94 repeater.

Walk in's only, no pre-registration.

# **ARES/RACES Website**

We are in the process of building a new website for ARES/RACES. Chris Johnson, KJ6IYG will be putting together a committee to consider what we should have on the site. We will have a couple of editors that will read the material uploaded by our members and correct the spelling and punctuation as well as considering the content of the material. We should have the new website up and running by the end of the summer.

# Digital Work Shop

Tuesday, July 14th at 18:00 hr. we had a digital workshop. The turnout was very small only 4 of us showed up. One good thing was Richard had the time to help one of the new Hams with the fine art of Fldqi and PSK-31.

We are trying to expand the workshop to help anyone interested in Amateur Radio and its challenges. We would like to help some of the new guys with setting up and maintaining their station. Many of the new people have questions about how to choose an antenna or radio that will cover their needs. These are some of the questions we will try to answer. Our mission is to help new and experienced operators become better at their craft and have fun. Our next workshop will take place Aug. 11 at 18:30 at the Salvation Army Citadel.

# Moonlight Madness & Ham Radio

The event was held by the Clovis Independent Four Wheeler's by special use permit from the Sierra National Forest. Rob Mavis (AE6GE) & Greg Waters (KJ6OUI) operated HF, VHF, and UHF portable radios at the Clovis Independent four wheel club's Bald Mt. basecamp. A get on the air (GOTA) station was available for all those participating at the poker run. A Boafeng UV-82 HT radio was donated in CARP's name as a raffle prize. A special event FCC license was used for this event from June 21 to June 29. The call sign was K6M (Kilo 6 Mike).

Field Day occurred the same weekend as Clovis Independent four wheel club's poker run, "Moonlight madness". For the last 100 years, every year on the fourth full weekend in June, over 35,000 amateur radio operators across the United States practice operating under simulated emergency communications. Basecamp was large enough for RV's, trailers and tent camping. There was no water or garbage services, so we packed everything in and out. Port-A-Potties were available the whole weekend.

The communication post was not limited to contacting other amateur radio operators. In case of the need to contact 911, family, or friends, amateur radio operators in the valley were on standby the whole weekend to aid in relaying radio communications to a phone. Handouts about all the advantages of use in off road communications and amateur radio as a hobby were distributed to over 50 attendees of the event.

Rob and I are in the process of organizing a multiple weekend ham technician class this fall for those in the 4x4 hobby. Over a dozen expressed great interest in getting their license and also interested in Emcomm training as the similarities cross over well.

# **UV204** TUBE OF THE MONTH by Norm, N6JV, from the NCCC Jug magazine

In World War I, the General Electric company pro-duced a 250 dissipation triode called the Type P Pliotron. It fits into its socket like a very large fuse. After the War when commercial production began, this tube was designated the UV204 and was sold by RCA. The original tube had the same spherical envelope as the Type P, but soon the cylindrical envelope was adopted.

The UV204, like almost all the early tubes, was designed for low frequency as the short-waves were only then being experimented with. This tube was being marketed to the commercial broadcast industry that wasn't interested in short-waves. For hams, this tube was about the on-ly choice for the big gun. QST articles showed large breadboards with push pull UV204's in Hartley oscillators. A slightly modernized version, the 204A, was still in use during WWII.

This example from about 1921 has an anode using unplaited metal that looks like it was made from a bean can. Small rods of glass support the filament. The maximum frequency for full input was only 3 MHz. We still use the expression "250 watter" to-day when referring to this type tube and it's socket.

Rx seemed especially rough, but not surprising with all the convective activity still in our general area. When N1MM said I'd been operating for four hours, I pulled the plug. Bob N2NS

# SPACE NEWS ILLINOIS HIGH ALTITUDE BALLOON TO CARRY REPEATER AND SSTV

The Balloon Assisted Stratospheric Experiments team at DePauw University plans to launch a high altitude balloon, BASE-85, on August 8, 2015 at 07:45 CDT (UTC – 5). The launch will be from the Chanute Air Museum in Rantoul, Illinois which is approximately 100 miles south of Chicago. The amateur radio payload on this balloon will include:

- + Telemetry: APRS: 144.390Mhz, APRS.FI: WB9SA-11; QRZ: WB9SA
- + Cross-Band FM Repeater: Uplink 144.34 MHz; Downlink 446.025 MHz.
- + SSTV unit will operate on 147.48 MHz using Scottie2 -72 seconds on 30 seconds off.
- + 900 MHz tracking system.
- + DF beacon at 443 MHz

Through the continuing efforts of organizations like the <u>ARRL</u>, <u>Contest University</u>, <u>WWROF</u>, regional radio and contest clubs, and many others, today's Elmers are being immortalized on the Internet through webinars, videos, and presentations in various formats. We'll have their wisdom to enjoy for a long, long time.

Contest sponsors are evolving to strongly preserve and protect the integrity of the varied entry classes, so that the 'boy and his radio' (and 'girl and her radio') and the SOnR(A) entrants are scored only against their peers. The interval between contest end and contest results is growing ever shorter. The variety and frequency of radio contests continue to increase.

There **are** challenges, to be sure, including some that we've been facing for a while, such as an aging population, issues of continued recruitment into the hobby, and the public perception of relevance in the face of other communications technologies.

But on balance, it's great to be a ham in 2015!
